They were kept very busy with a large number of visitors coming to the station just to do the train ride as well as the usual visitors from the Village. It has brought in much needed income. PRESIDENT'S REPORT

Welcome to 2018 and if our progress this year is as good as 2017 we are in for a very busy year.

Last year our volunteers worked a mighty 13,201 hours, a great effort by our track crew, train crew and everyone involved in the restoration of our locomotive and carriage. We have achieved a lot thus far and can see the light at the end of the tunnel in many areas.

We now have maintenance vehicles spread along the length of our track making it possible to keep the vegetation down and fire breaks maintained, as well as making it easy to keep these sections of track in gauge, making sure that we can traverse all parts safely. We have also now finished replacing bridge 11 with steel culverts, with work on bridge 12 due to commence shortly. We are planning on removing all bridges between Platypus Park Station and Wongabel which will leave only four bridges between Moomin and Herberton. These will eventually have the timber structures replaced with steel.

It is also planned to operate a small train ride between Platypus Park Station and Hastie Rd this year with a new carriage presently being built at the Herberton workshops. Our timber carriage is progressing well along with our loco 1069. Over the Christmas/New Year period we invited all of our train passengers to tour our workshop and see our progress. This proved a huge success with positive comments from our visitors. It also helped raise our profile within the wider community.

We still require more funding to make sure our project does not slow up and need some **urgent** help from our members and supporters. So if you know of any one or business that may contribute to our project please let myself or our Secretary, Judy Cooper know and we will contact them with a proposal. Our last mail out had a positive result so we need to keep talking to people and letting them know about our exciting project.

We will be holding a fundraising dinner in the shed at Herberton on Saturday 21st April 2018 so please keep this evening free, more information will be out and about in the next few weeks.


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RESTORATION OF PECKETTS 1069 AND 1174

Flash Back...

From the

Bundaberg Mail and Burnett Advertiser Friday 28 February 1908

RAILWAY TO HERBERTON

On February 14, Mr Thallon, Commissioner for Railways, accompanied by Mr Fraser (District Engineer), Mr Stringer (who is at present on the final survey of the railway), and two officers of the Railway Department visited Herberton (says the Wild River Times) for the purpose of selecting a site for the station and transacting other business in connection therewith. The visitors were met on arrival by Mr Woods M.L.A. and after finally deciding on a site near the Oddfellows Hall, were entertained at a wine party at Smyths Hotel given by the Shire Council and Chamber of Commerce. Responding to the toast of his health, Mr Thallon stated that when he was here two years ago he had his doubts as to whether his report would be favourable or not, but after further reports and information coming to hand, and from careful perusal of same, he was satisfied that the railway would prove payable from the start. He was pleased to be able to inform the people of Herberton that all plans, reports, surveys, etc. had been prepared and were now in the hands of the Minister, and his report also, approving the construction of the line. All that was necessary now was the approval of the plans and the voting of the money for its construction.

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Look how different the line between Atherton and Herberton looked in the early years with many stations and sidings.

Atherton

- Tumbare (Aboriginal name for spear) – namepost only serving an adjacent dairy farm
- Wirpoo (Aboriginal name for Tea tree) – serving Mr Thomas' sawmill and a shelter shed
- Nyleta (Aboriginal name for wild honey) opposite the wetland swamp. Logs were shipped out from this siding. The shelter shed was removed in 1960 and station closed 1972.
- Wongabel (Aboriginal name for wood pigeon) – important log loading point for timber for the local timber cutters.
- Ballast siding Used to load material from adjacent cutting faces.
- Carrington Falls with its weir and standpipe. It was used to top up the steam engines with water for the long haul up the range. When diesels took over in 1966, the standpipe was no longer needed.
- Moomin (Aboriginal name for native bees or honey) – logging traffic from there ceased about 1958.
- G.N. Tin Mines Siding it served the Great Northern Tin Mining battery on the banks of the Wild River. Many tons of tin concentrates left for Cairns from the siding.
- Herberton
